WEEK OF DIOCESAN ASSEMBLY OF PRIESTS AND DEACONS JANUARY 20TH TO 22ND 2020

INTRODUCTION

In the third week of January Bishop Denis will lead a Kildare and Leighlin diocesan assembly of priests and deacons in Athlone. This will mean that in many of the parishes of our diocese there will not be a priest available to celebrate weekday Mass. However, Bishop Denis is encouraging parishes to keep their normal schedule of weekday liturgy from January 20th to 22nd and for parishioners to continue to gather for prayer on those days when they normally celebrate Mass.

Furthermore, Bishop Denis is inviting people across the diocese to join in praying for the needs and the people of the diocese in union with our priests and deacons. Parishioners are invited to write their prayer intentions and leave them in the church. Families are invited to pray the diocesan prayer in the home during this week while the weekday assemblies of people are encouraged to bring the needs and people of the diocese to their prayer together.

As we read in Acts, gathering for public prayer on a weekday has been part of the earliest tradition of the Church, even in the absence of an ordained priest. Over time a particular prayer form emerged for these weekday gatherings, namely the liturgy of the hours (or what some might have heard referred to as the Divine Office). To this day, the liturgy of the hours, with its principal hours of Morning and Evening Prayer, is the daily prayer of the Church. This prayer continues to be prayed across the world; it is rightfully the prayer of the people of God. When Mass cannot be celebrated in the parish the Church recommends this prayer, or a Celebration of God's Word, as the most suitable alternative.

As a people we can be assured that, even in the absence of an ordained priest, when we gather to pray in God's name Christ is with us, nourishing us with his presence. When we proclaim the Word of God it is Christ who speaks to us, nourishing us with his Word.

This resource book is offered by Kildare and Leighlin Faith Development Services and the Kildare and Leighlin Diocese Commission for Liturgical Formation to support parishioners in praying together during this week of prayer for the people of the diocese, as well as supporting prayer in the home. Its content can also serve as a model for other times when a priest is not available to celebrate Mass on a weekday.

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SUNDAY MASS SUGGESTIONS

Sunday, January 19th 2020 2nd SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The opportunity can be taken at Masses in parishes today to publicly bless those who will lead prayer in the parish during the coming week, in the absence of the priest(s) of the parish. This daily prayer can be seen as praying in union with the Bishop, priests and deacons of the diocese while they are away.

OUTLINE OF CONTENT FOR SUNDAY

- Blessing of prayer leaders and presentation of prayer resource book.
- Invitation to parishioners to share prayer intentions.
- Use of two texts for the prayer of the faithful on Sunday and the weekdays.
- Prayer for the Diocese for use in the home and in the Church.
- Sunday Bulletin Notice template.

BLESSING OF PRAYER LEADERS AND PRESENTATION OF PRAYER RESOURCE BOOK.

After the homily the celebrant invites those who are to lead the daily prayer during the week to come forward.

He reminds the congregation that they have been invited by the parish and resourced by the diocese to fulfil this role.

He thanks them on behalf of the parish for their willingness to give this service. He then prays the following prayer over them (If desired, he can invite the assembly to extend their hands also):

PRAYER OF BLESSING

Blessed are you, Lord God, creator of the universe and Father of all:

you have called us to serve you and praise you in the family of your Church.

Help us to hear your word and praise you by our worship and our lives.

Look with love upon these men and women who are to lead your people in prayer this week.

Bless + them and fill them with your Spirit

so that they may proclaim your Word and guide us in our worship.

Through their service may your kingdom come among us

and may we be inspired to serve you each day.

We make this prayer through Christ our Lord. Amen

PRESENTATION: the celebrant gives a copy of the book of prayer resources to each leader, or to one of the leaders on behalf of them all, saying:

This is the Word of God. Be worthy of the message you proclaim among the people that God has called his own, and build up the body of Christ. Amen.

INVITATION TO PARISHIONERS TO SHARE PRAYER INTENTIONS:

Parishioners can be invited to write petitions for inclusion in the daily intercessory prayer. These can be very simple in nature. A box/container can be placed in the church for these petitions. One of the prayer leaders could check this box and include these prayers in the Intercessory prayer each day.

PRAYER OF THE FAITHFUL

The following two prayers can be included on the Sunday and on each day.

We pray for our bishop, Denis and for the priests and deacons of our diocese. May the Holy Spirit come upon them in a powerful way as they take part in their assembly so that they may be renewed to lead their people.

Lord, hear us.

We pray for all the people of our diocese; may the Lord's blessing come upon each one according to their need.

Lord, hear us.

DIOCESAN PRAYER FOR USE IN THE HOME AND AT THE SUNDAY & WEEKDAY LITURGY

The following diocesan prayer can be prayed each day by people in their homes as well as during or at the end of the Morning/Evening Prayer. It might also be used at the Sunday Mass at the conclusion of the Prayer of the Faithful or before the Final Blessing. Ideally this prayer will be printed on a prayer card for distribution or in the Parish Bulletin.

PRAYER FOR OUR DIOCESE

Lord, bless the faith community of Kildare & Leighlin which traces its origins to Brigid, Conleth and Laserian. May it be outstanding in charity as St. Brigid of Kildare, may it be constant in faith as St. Conleth of Old Connell, wise and prayerful as St. Laserian of Leighlin. Bless its Bishop, priests, deacons, religious & laity. Fill them with the light of your love. Bless its young people. Help them to seek your truth. Bless all who are poor or weak or wounded by life's hurts. Grant them justice, light and hope. Sin é ár nguí tré Críost ár dTiarna. Amen.

BULLETIN NOTICE TEMPLATES

The following two notices can be adapted locally to best suit needs.

1. PRAYING IN UNION WITH OUR PRIESTS FOR THE PEOPLE AND NEEDS OF OUR DIOCESE

Bishop Denis is leading an assembly of the priests and deacons of the diocese in Athlone from the afternoon of January 19th to the 22nd. During this time, Bishop Denis is inviting the people of the diocese to join with him, the priests and deacons in praying for the needs and intentions of all in our diocese. You are very welcome to write your own prayer intentions in the space provided in the church. These will be prayed for during the week at the liturgies that will be celebrated in our parish. You are also invited to pray the diocesan prayer each day during the week in the home.

We will be keeping the following schedule in the church this week: (indicate times and days of Morning Prayer/ Celebration of the Word)

(If/As applicable) Masses will be available locally in the coming week as follows: (Day, time, church)

2. WHY ARE WE PRAYING MORNING PRAYER?

(The text in bold is a shorter form that can be used as an alternative to the longer notice.)

As recorded in Scripture, alongside the primary gathering that was Sunday Eucharist, in early church communities people also assembled on weekdays for the daily nourishment of shared prayer. In this way they were responding to the call to pray without ceasing. While undergoing different forms over the centuries, what we know today as the Liturgy of the Hours (or what some might have heard referred to as the Divine Office) is considered to have been the daily prayer of Christians from the beginning.

To this day, the Liturgy of the Hours, with its principal hours of Morning and Evening Prayer, continues to be the daily prayer of the Church. Every day this prayer is prayed across the world; it is rightfully the prayer of the people of God. When Mass cannot be celebrated in the parish the Church recommends this prayer, or a Celebration of God's Word, as the most suitable alternative.

The psalms have been called the prayer book of the Christian and at the heart of the Liturgy of the Hours is the praying of the psalms. Alongside Scripture, prayers of intercession and hymns of praise, the Liturgy of the Hours gives us an opportunity to connect with this Christian prayer book in a new way as the psalms are prayerfully recited by the community who have gathered to pray together.

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ACCOMPANYING NOTES ON MORNING PRAYER

<u>SET UP</u> Aside from other set up considerations, before people gather for this prayer, any candles that are usually in place near or on the ambo and altar are lit.

<u>THE OPENING VERSE</u> The prayer leader begins the prayer from their appointed place. The prayer leader, unless he is a priest, does not sit in the presider's chair (or the priest's chair) but is in a position where he/she is both visible and audible. Just as we do at any other liturgical prayer in the church, we stand for the opening. Remembering the promise of Jesus, 'Where two or three are gathered in my name I am there', in our posture of standing we are showing honour to Christ and greeting the risen Lord in our midst.

As is also customary, we mark ourselves with the sign of the cross. This is typically done as people make the response to the leader, 'O Lord, make haste to help us'/ 'And my mouth will proclaim your praise'. This verse can be recited or sung.

THE HYMN The opening hymn is intended to be a familiar hymn that all present can sing, for example 'Christ be beside Me' or 'Be Thou my Vision'. It might speak to the time of day. It might speak of praise, creation, or gathering. During the seasons of Advent/Christmas, Lent/Easter, a seasonal hymn can be used. In many instances in a local parish this will be without accompaniment so care should be taken in its selection. Incense may be placed in a bowl during the singing of this hymn.

<u>PSALMODY</u> Just as we do at other celebrations, people sit for the praying of the psalms. The psalms have often been called the Christian prayer book and the praying of the psalms is at the heart of the Liturgy of the Hours. Over the course of four weeks, through the various Hours that are prayed by the Church, practically all 150 psalms are prayed. Thus, in a four week cycle each Hour is assigned particular psalms and canticles.

For a local community starting out with this prayer, it may be too ambitious to do all the psalms assigned to a particular hour on a particular day. A community may decide to do two, or even one, initially. A community may also decide to settle on a particular set of psalms and repeat them daily/weekly before, over time, expanding the repertoire of psalms prayed. For this week of prayer two texts have been selected on each day. Those leading the prayer should consider how to lead these psalms in a way to ensure that they are not rushed.

A psalm may be sung using a psalm tone or it may be sung using a responsorial style, as we experience at Mass. The psalms can also be recited in a number of different ways: 1) alternating between two groups, i.e. men/women, one side of the church and the other; 2) alternating between the leader and the whole group or 3) recited by just one person. Typically, recited or chanted psalms conclude with the prayer, Glory be...

Each psalm is assigned an *antiphon* for the particular Hour. This is usually a verse of a psalm or other piece of Scripture. The antiphon text contains the fundamental thought of the psalm to which it is allotted, and indicates the point of view from which the psalm can be understood.

The *silence* between the psalms is very necessary, allowing time for what we have just prayed in the psalm to enter deeper into our hearts before moving onto the next one.

The two psalms of the hour are traditionally accompanied by an Old Testament Canticle (hymn) in the morning and a New Testament Canticle in the evening.

<u>SCRIPTURE READING</u> This can be led from the ambo (the place from where readings are normally proclaimed in church) and is read by someone other than the prayer leader. Unlike in the Mass, the reader simply proclaims the verses without an introduction or conclusion, i.e. without saying 'A Reading

From...The Word of the Lord'. Each Liturgy of the Hours on a given day has a particular reading assigned to it. As this is a very short reading, its verses may be extended. After this reading people are given time to ponder, pray and reflect on the Word of God they have just received.

<u>SHORT RESPONSORY</u> In both morning and evening prayer a short responsory verse is assigned to follow the Scripture reading. When used, it is led by the leader with the people responding. The responsory is linked to the reading that has gone before it. It serves as a kind of acclamation, enabling God's Word to enter deeper into the heart and mind of the one listening or reading.

<u>GOSPEL CANTICLE</u> The leader introduces the Canticle (Hymn) by standing and reciting its antiphon. This Gospel text is the highpoint of Morning Prayer. We mark this highpoint by moving to a standing posture and by blessing ourselves at the beginning of the Canticle. It can be further emphasised through the use of incense. This might be as simple as placing grains of incense on the coal as the Canticle begins.

Ideally the Canticle is sung. It might be part of the goals of a leadership group to work towards having a setting for the Benedictus that is both familiar and popular in your particular parish. This is especially recommended given that the Gospel Canticle will be prayed every time you gather for Morning Prayer.

INTERCESSIONS While remaining standing, we present our prayers and intercessions to God. Again, there are intercessions assigned to the Hour but these can be adapted or added to, depending on local needs. It is at this point that parishes are invited to pray for the intentions that have been written by people. As shared prayer, these prayers can be led by someone other than the prayer leader. Some parishes might choose to sing a simple response to the intercessions.

<u>THE LORD'S PRAYER</u> The prayer leader invites all to pray the Lord's Prayer together. The praying of the Lord's Prayer at Morning Prayer flows from the early Church tradition of Christians praying the Lord's Prayer thrice daily. Recited or sung, it reminds us of the daily nourishment we receive from God, even in the absence of Eucharist.

<u>CONCLUDING PRAYER AND CONCLUSION OF HOUR</u> The prayer leader draws the time of prayer to a close with a concluding prayer. This concluding prayer may be one that 1) is taken from the Hour of the day, 2) is repeated at each gathering or 3) may be one that is seasonal in nature and tone. In this resource we are using the text of the diocesan prayer as the concluding prayer for each day. After this prayer, those gathered make the Sign of the Cross as the prayer leader asks God's blessing on him/her and those gathered. The people respond, Amen. This conclusion can be sung or recited.

The following steps are suggested to groups as they meet and work with the prayer, preparing it in order to take it from a text to an experience of shared, communal prayer.

1. Read the accompanying notes for morning prayer fully and then read the text of the particular morning prayer

Each participant reads through the full text of the prayer by themselves, noting the different elements as they already saw on their previous handout on the format of Morning Prayer. Try to imagine the prayer beyond the text and how it might be prayed in your particular church building.

2. Consider the following as a group

As you do so, bear in mind all the time the people in your parish who ultimately you hope will pray this prayer, or similar, in your particular church when Mass is not possible.

a) <u>The prayer space</u> Think of the setting of this prayer, the space in which people will gather. How will this space be prepared? Where will be the focus of people's attention? If people are praying before the sanctuary, the altar candles and any candles by the ambo are lit for this prayer. Will you make any particular set up changes in the church for this prayer? Consider the seating arrangement of all who gather and where the prayer leader will sit. Think about the lighting, heat and sound that might be needed.

b) <u>The final text to be used</u> Again, consider the people who will gather for this prayer. In light of this, are you happy to go with the text as provided or do you need to make any amendments? Is there an alternative opening hymn you would like to use? Are there other intercessions you would prefer to use? Do you wish to extend the verses in the scripture reading on any of the days?

c) <u>Praying the psalms</u> How will the psalms be prayed in your particular setting? It might be a combination of alternating verses between a reader and people, between men and women, between one side of the church and another, reading the psalm through together or with a single voice. Depending on resources, one or more of the texts might even be sung! If recited, think carefully about how you will facilitate the psalm being prayed meditatively and slowly rather than being rushed through!

d) <u>Verbal elements</u> Think of the verbal elements of this prayer, for example, the opening and closing of the prayer time, the psalms and scripture, intercessions, invitation to pray the Lord's Prayer and the concluding prayer and to whom these elements are being addressed. When proclaiming texts to the assembly, for example scripture, remember to actually look at the people as much as you can, rather than having your head buried in a text. Anyone leading these verbal elements should do so slowly and clearly.

Who will speak these different verbal elements? How many people do you need from the point of view of readers and prayer leader? How will you ensure that these people can be heard? (Note: A folder can be left on the ambo before the prayer starts with the day's reading and intercessions.)

e) <u>Music</u> Consider when music might be used during this prayer. Whilst you might wish to start modestly, the full set of possibilities include: opening and closing verse, the opening hymn, psalmody,

Benedictus, response to intercessions and the Lord's Prayer. At a minimum could you sing the opening hymn and the Benedictus? The text of the Benedictus provided in this Morning Prayer resource can be sung to the air of 'The King of Love My Shepherd is'.

f) Non-verbal elements Consider the non-verbal elements in the prayer, such as movement, posture (standing/sitting), gesture (sign of the cross, bowing) and pace of the prayer. How might these non-verbal elements be carried out with reverence and grace? How will the use of silence be best utilised to enhance the prayer experience? How will you ensure that the silence will happen? Will incense be used during the singing of the opening hymn and the Gospel Canticle? Something as simple as leading the prayer with the use of a folder rather than loose sheets of paper speaks volumes!

g) Participation of the people & hospitality to them What do you think will help people's participation in this prayer? How can you help to involve them in the prayer? How will they be welcomed and how will they have what they need in order to pray this prayer? Will it be clear in any welcome before the prayer that the prayer leaders are there on behalf of and in the name of the parish in this instance when your priest cannot be with you for the celebration of Mass, if this is the case? Any instructions to people, for example about how the psalms will be prayed, ought to be done before the prayer begins and not during. Who will give this instruction? A vital part of hospitality requires that those preparing and /or leading prayer arrive in good time and have everything in place before people arrive for prayer!

h) <u>Openings and closings</u> Think about how this prayer will begin and finish. How will the prayer leader take his/her place among people and how will they depart? Remember that it is worth taking those extra few seconds to settle in your place and be present in a space before beginning. A prayer leader might spend some moments seated in quiet prayer before standing to begin the prayer.

i) <u>Assigning tasks</u> Having looked at this prayer and having made some decisions together, what ministers do you need to assign to it: prayer leader, readers, music, hospitality, set up & putting away, instruction giver (!), other?

Begin to put names beside the tasks.

j) <u>Final check</u> Have you everything in place that you need in order to pray this prayer? Is there any one that needs to be communicated with ahead of time, i.e. sacristan, parish secretary, key holder...? Is everyone clear on what they have to do? Is there any clarification needed?

Words of Introduction for Each Day

Monday

On this day we gather as a Christian community as we normally would but, because our priest cannot be with us, we are unable to celebrate the Mass. However, we have the gift of Morning Prayer that we can pray together. This is the prayer of the Church, the prayer which belongs to the people of God. Because we gather in the name of the Lord we can be assured that Christ is with us and among us.

In this time let us offer our praise to God and bring our needs and the needs of the people of the diocese to him in prayer, as we join in prayerful union with our bishop, priests and deacons of the diocese as they hold their assembly. (pause)

And so as we begin, let us hold Bishop Denis, our priests, our deacons, our parish and our diocese in prayer. (pause)

Tuesday

Today we gather as a Christian community, to pray the Morning Prayer of the Church.

To-day is the feast of St Agnes. She was martyred in Rome at the end of the third – or beginning of the fourth century. Agnes aged 13, chose Christ as her spouse, refused to worship the Roman Gods, was denounced and condemned to death. She is the patron of young women.

As part of this praying community we offer our praise to God and bring our needs and the needs of the people of the diocese to him in prayer. (pause)

And so as we begin, let us hold Bishop Denis, our priests, our deacons, our parish and our diocese in prayer. (pause)

Wednesday

As we begin the Morning Prayer of the Church we remember that this is the week of Prayer for Christian Unity. The theme chosen for 2020 is from the Acts of the Apostles.

'They showed us unusual kindness'

This theme stresses the unusual kindness given to St. Paul when he was shipwrecked on one of his missionary journeys. Through kindness people are drawn closer together, heeding the prayer of Jesus, 'that they all may be one'

Because we gather in the name of the Lord we can be assured that Christ is with us and among us.

We offer our praise to God and bring our needs and the needs of the many migrants and refugees who seek a better life, to Him in prayer. (pause)

As we begin, let us hold Bishop Denis, our priests, our deacons, our parish and our diocese in prayer. (pause)

READING FOR MORNING PRAYER EACH DAY

The reader at Morning Prayer reads the assigned reading from the ambo without any introductory or concluding phrases, i.e. the reader does not say "A reading from" or "The Word of the Lord".

Monday Morning Scripture Reading

When your words came, I devoured them: your word was my delight and the joy of my heart; for I was called by your name, Lord, God of hosts.

Tuesday Morning Scripture Reading

Let us give thanks to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the merciful Father, the God from whom all help comes! He helps us in all our troubles, so that we are able to help those who have all kinds of troubles, using the same help that we ourselves have received from God. Just as we have a share in Christ's many sufferings so also through Christ we share in his great help.

Wednesday Morning Prayer

Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will affliction, or distress, or persecution, or hunger, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword? Yet in all this we are conquerors, through him who has granted us his love.

Jeremiah 15:16

2 Cor 1:3-5

Intercessions for Each Day

Intercessions written by parishioners can be included at this time

MONDAY INTERCESSIONS

RESPONSE: Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Christ has given us all a share in his priesthood. We offer our prayers and ourselves in union with him. (pause) (R)

Jesus Christ, you are the eternal priest: make this morning's offering acceptable to the Father (pause) (R)

Lord, you are love itself: grant that we may love you. (pause) (R)

Give us today the fruits of the Holy Spirit: make us patient, kind and gentle. (pause) (R)

Give us the discernment to know the needs of our neighbours and give us the courage to love them as brothers and sisters. (pause) (R)

TUESDAY INTERCESSIONS Response: Lord, graciously hear us.

Gathered together in faith and worship, on this feast of St Agnes, we turn to God confident in his care of us as we pray. (pause) Lord hear us. (R)

May we take example from the courage shown by St Agnes. May our faith be a beacon in the world. (pause) Lord hear us (**R**)

Through the intercession of St Agnes, we ask God to bless and protect all our young people. (pause) Lord hear us. (R)

In times of doubt and despair may we be strengthened by the presence of God. (pause) Lord hear us. (R)

Be with Bishop Denis and all our priests and deacons in these days of their assembly, as they ponder your word and pray for your guidance. (pause) Lord hear us. (R)

We pray for our own particular needs this day. (pause) Lord hear us. (R)

WEDNESDAY INTERCESSIONS Response: Lord, graciously hear us.

We pray for all who help share the Word of God in our parish, for our parish team, readers, baptism team members, teachers and parents

that their love of the Word may deepen and grow. (pause) Lord, hear us. (R)

Lord, you have given us life and light this morning: let us give thanks for such great gifts. (pause) Lord, hear us. (R)

May your Church be united heart and soul as we remember Bishop Denis and the priests and deacons of the Diocese and may your faithful be joined in continuous prayer with Mary the Mother of Jesus. (pause) Lord, hear us. (R)

Through the prayers of Mary, our Mother, heal the sick, comfort the sorrowful, pardon sinners; and grant peace and salvation to all. (pause) Lord, hear us. (R)

We pray for all the intentions that have been written by parishioners during this week. (R) (pause) Lord, hear us.

Accompanying Notes on a Celebration of the Word

<u>SET UP</u> Aside from other set up considerations, before the liturgy begins, any candles that are usually in place near or on the ambo and altar are lit.

OPENING HYMN The opening hymn unites into one voice all who have gathered as they stand to greet the risen Lord in their midst and begin their time of prayer together. Therefore, this hymn of necessity is one that is known and familiar to those who have gathered. Familiar seasonal hymns are also very appropriate. The opening hymn typically begins when the prayer leader stands in his/her place, marking the beginning of the time of prayer. Again, the prayer leader does not sit in the presider's chair (priest's chair) but should be positioned in a location where he/she is both visible and audible.

<u>CARRYING IN OF THE LECTIONARY</u> Given the focus of this liturgy on the Word of God, it would be very appropriate for a member of the community to carry the Lectionary (the ritual book containing the readings) in procession to the ambo during the singing of the opening hymn and to place it on the ambo.

<u>OPENING GREETING</u> The text of this exchange between prayer leader and people once more highlights the importance of God's Word. It begins with all present making the Sign of the Cross upon themselves.

WORDS OF INTRODUCTION These words, spoken by the prayer leader, might acknowledge from the outset that we are gathering in the absence of an ordained priest and, because of this, we are unable to celebrate the Eucharist. Alternatively, they may very succinctly look forward to something that will be heard in the readings to come or they might make reference to the particular day in the liturgical calendar on which the celebration is taking place. Words of introduction are provided in the text in this resource book. On other occasions, these or similar words might be used.

For example: Once again we gather here to be Church. Christ is present with us, as he promised: present in this assembly of his people and in the proclamation of God's Word. As an ordained priest cannot be with us we are unable to celebrate the Eucharist. Today, let us be united in the spirit of Christ with the Church around the world, let us hear and respond to God's Word and give God thanks and praise. We look forward to when we can once more gather together to celebrate the Eucharist.

<u>PENITENTIAL ACT</u> To prepare ourselves to hear the Word of God we acknowledge our need for God's mercy and love in the Penitential Act using formulae similar to those which we find in the Mass.

<u>COLLECT</u> This prayer is led by the prayer leader. As in the case of all opening and closing prayers, the prayer begins with an invitation to the people to pray, *Let us pray*, which is followed by a moment of silence. In this silence, people bring their own prayer to the common prayer to follow. In this way, the common prayer literally *collects* the people's prayers into one. The people give their assent to this prayer with their Amen.

LITURGY OF THE WORD – TEXTS The Liturgy of the Word in a celebration such as this one will typically employ the texts for the Mass of the day. However, on particular occasions parishes may choose to deviate from these texts. Volume III of the Lectionary provides a selection of readings for various needs and occasions. While what is happening in the life of the parish might suggest other readings.

THE READINGS The readings, including the Gospel, can be proclaimed by a variety of parish readers and by people other than the prayer leader. As is always the case, there is no need to say 'The first reading' or 'The responsorial psalm, the response is...' The Gospel is introduced with the following words: 'A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to N.'

THE PSALM If possible, we are led in the singing of a responsorial psalm. To this end, we might build up a small repertoire of psalms and use these often, rather than using the psalm of the day. Alternatively, the response might be sung with spoken verses or all of the psalm might be recited by a reader with people reciting the response.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION All stand for the Gospel Acclamation which is intended to be sung.

SILENCE Silence is observed between all the readings in order for people to have time to ponder God's Word. The length of this silence can be developed as time goes on and people get used to it. Any sense of rush should be avoided to the utmost.

People will need to be invited to sit for a time of silence after the reading of the Gospel.

REFLECTION The prayer leader or other member of the community may read a reflection or commentary on the readings. There is a growing body of commentaries available for such use and we have included some in this resource material.

SUNG RESPONSE Having pondered God's Word, the people stand and join in singing a hymn in response to the gift and nourishment of the Word.

INTERCESSIONS All continue to stand for the intercessions, which can have a sung response.

OUR FATHER The prayer leader invites people to pray the Lord's Prayer.

<u>CONCLUDING PRAYER</u> As in the case of the Opening Prayer, a set prayer can be put in place for any Celebrations of the Word that take place in the parish or this prayer might take a seasonal tone. Again, a prayer of the day is provided in this resource.

GESTURE OF REVERENCE TO THE SCRIPTURES As one of the final actions of this prayer, parishes might consider inviting those who have gathered to make a gesture of reverence to the Scriptures. Depending on circumstance, this might involve one of the readers of the day coming forward at this point and holding the closed Lectionary aloft while the prayer leader and the congregation bow to it. Or it might involve all who have gathered coming forward to kiss / make a bow to the Lectionary.

<u>CLOSING VERSE AND DISMISSAL</u> The prayer closes with the invitation to bless the Lord after which all respond and make the Sign of the Cross, before concluding with the words of dismissal and response. Again, both of these verses can be sung if desired.

<u>CLOSING HYMN</u> A well known hymn concludes the celebration. Again, this can be seasonal in nature. Alternatively, people may depart in silence.

Preparation Meeting Guide for a Celebration of the Word

The following steps are suggested to parishes as members meet to prepare the prayer in order to take it from a text for prayer to an experience of shared, communal prayer.

1 Read the accompanying notes and the text of the day fully

Each participant reads through the full text of the Celebration of the Word by themselves, noting the different elements as they already saw on the handout on the format of a Celebration of the Word. Try to imagine the prayer beyond the text, as it might be prayed in your particular church by those who gather.

2 Consider the following as a group:

As you do so, bear in mind all the time the people in your parish who ultimately you hope will pray this prayer, or similar, in your particular church when Mass is not possible.

a) The prayer space

Think of the setting of this prayer, the space in which people will gather. How will this space be prepared? Where will be the focus of people's attention? If people are praying before the sanctuary, the altar candles and any candles by the ambo are lit for this prayer. Will you make any particular set up changes in the church for this prayer? Consider the seating arrangement of all who gather and where the prayer leader will sit. Think about the lighting, heat and sound that might be needed.

b) The final text to be used

Again, consider the people who will gather for this prayer. In light of this, are you happy to go with the text as provided or do you need to make any amendments? For example, do you need to change any of the hymn suggestions?

c) <u>Verbal elements</u>

Think of the verbal elements of this prayer, for example, the opening and closing of the prayer time, the psalms and scripture, commentary / reflection, intercessions, invitation to pray the Lord's Prayer and the concluding prayer. When proclaiming texts to the assembly, for example, scripture, remember to actually look at the people as much as you can, rather than having your head buried in a text. Anyone leading these verbal elements should do so slowly and clearly.

Who will speak these different verbal elements? How many people do you need from the point of view of readers and prayer leader? How will you ensure that these people can be heard? Will someone source and read a reflection on the readings?

d) Non-verbal elements

Consider the non-verbal elements in the prayer, such as movement, posture (standing/ sitting), gesture (sign of the cross, bowing) and pace of the prayer. How might these non-verbal elements be carried out with reverence and grace? How will the use of silence be best utilised to enhance the prayer experience? How will you ensure that the silence will happen? Will the Lectionary be carried in at the

beginning? Will people be invited to reverence the Lectionary with a bow before the conclusion of the celebration?

e) Participation of the people & hospitality to them

What do you think will help people's participation in this prayer? How can you help to involve them in the prayer? How will they be welcomed and how will they have what they need in order to pray this prayer? Will it be clear in any welcome before the prayer that the prayer leaders are there on behalf of and in the name of the parish in this instance when your priest cannot be with you for the celebration of Mass, if this is the case?

Any instructions to people is better done before the prayer begins and not during. This can be done by someone other than the individual prayer leader assigned to the prayer. A vital part of hospitality requires that those preparing and leading prayer arrive in good time and have everything in place before people arrive for prayer!

f) Openings and closings

Think about how this prayer will begin and finish. How will the prayer leader take his/her place among people and how will they depart? Remember that it is worth taking those extra few seconds to settle in your place and be present in a space before beginning. A prayer leader might spend some moments seated in quiet prayer before standing to begin the prayer.

g) <u>Assigning tasks</u>

Having looked at this prayer and having made some decisions together, what ministers do you need to assign to it: prayer leader, readers, reflection, music, hospitality, set up (& putting away!), other? Begin to put names beside the tasks.

h) Final check

Have you everything in place that you need in order to pray this prayer next time you gather? Is there any one that needs to be communicated with ahead of time, i.e. sacristan, parish secretary, key holder...?

Is everyone clear on what they have to do? Any clarification needed?

GOSPEL REFLECTION

We are all familiar with sayings like, 'never judge a book by its cover', 'all that glitters is not gold'. Such sayings put into words a truth that people have picked up from long experience. We know that something can look good, but the reality may not measure up to the appearance. The

What is true of objects is also true of people; appearances can be deceptive. That comes across very clearly in today's first reading. Gospel Reflections for use 20, 21 & 22 January 2020

Gospel Reflection: Monday January 20, Second Week in Ordinary Time Mark 2:18-22

In today's gospel reading, Jesus uses a real celebratory image to speak of himself and ministry. He is like the bridegroom at his wedding banquet, and his disciples are like those who attend the bridegroom. The presence of Jesus is a celebratory presence. As Jesus was with his first disciples then, so the risen Lord is with us now in the same celebratory way. There is no doubt that life can be full of sorrow and distress for people, for any one of us at some time or other. The presence of the risen Lord does not spare us from the trials and tribulations of life which can bring us deep sorrow and grief. Yet the Lord's presence in itself is never to be a cause of sadness or gloom. In another gospel, the Gospel of John, Jesus says to his disciples, 'I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete.' Even in the midst of life's sorrows and losses, Jesus wants us to experience something of his joy. This joy is the fruit of the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of God's Love. It has it's source in God's love for us, revealed in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, and poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit. Regardless of what comes our way in life to cause us distress God's lifegiving love for us is assured. Just as the love of God the Father brought Jesus through death into a new lie, so it will always bring the light of life into our darkness.

Gospel Reflection: Tuesday January 21, Second Week in Ordinary Time Mark 2:23-28

We are all familiar with sayings like, 'never judge a book by its cover', 'all that glitters is not gold'. Such sayings put into words a truth that people have picked up from long experience. We know that something can look good, but the reality may not measure up to the appearance. The opposite, of course, can also be the case. What looks unimpressive can turn out to be of great quality. People can be in possession of treasures for many years without realising it. What is true of objects is also true of people; appearances can be deceptive. That comes across very clearly in today's first reading. When Samuel caught sight of Jesse's first son, he said, 'Surely the Lord's anointed one stands there', but he was wrong. The son of Jesse whom the Lord had chosen was someone whom Jesse hadn't even considered it worth his while to bring to Samuel. As the reading expresses, it, 'God does not see what we see, we look at appearances, but the Lord looks at the heart'. The Lord sees deeper than we do, and that is why his choices can seem so strange to us. It is because the Lord sees deeper than we do that we should leave judgement to the Lord as much as possible. We have to keep on suspending judgement, because our capacity for real insight into others is very limited. In the gospel reading, the Pharisees were judging Jesus' disciples because they were looking at appearances. Jesus, however, knew their hearts and did not hesitate to defend them before their critics. Because the Lord looks at the heart, it is important for us to get our hearts in the right place, to keep focusing our heart on the Lord and on his will for our lives.

Gospel Reflection: Wednesday January 22, Second Week in Ordinary Time Mark 3:1-6

Mark's Gospel give us the most human portrait of Jesus. Mark, more than the other evangelists, often attributes emotions to Jesus. In today's gospel reading he makes reference to Jesus' grief and anger. 'Grieved to find them so obstinate, he looked angrily round at them'. Jesus was grieved that the religious authorities were so opposed to his work of healing a man on the Sabbath. His grief, as is often the case with human grief, is mixed with anger. The evangelist is portraying Jesus as being in a highly emotional state. We know from our own experience that strong emotions like grief and anger can easily control us and take us over. Jesus was able to channel these strong emotions in a lifegiving way. The energies of these emotions in his life became energies for the furthering of God's kingdom. He went on to heal the man with the withered hand. We can sometimes make a very negative judgement about the strong emotions that we experience within us. Such feelings in themselves are not something negative; it is how we channel them that matters. Like Jesus, we are called to channel our strong emotions in ways that serve God's purpose for our lives and for the lives of others. Grace builds on nature and grace can transform all our emotional energies into sources of life and wellbeing for all who cross our path in life. The Spirit can direct all our emotional energies towards the doing of God's work.
