The Synodal Pathway in Ireland takes a step forward...

Over 250 delegates and Bishops from across the country met in a daylong assembly in Kilkenny on 18 October. Representing dioceses, ecclesial bodies and movements, they spent the day exploring the discernment from the Spring listening sessions and looking to next steps towards a national assembly in 2026.

Seven priorities were presented by the National Synodal Team for discussion amongst delegates:

Belonging: fostering a Church of welcome, inclusion, and safety where each person finds a home in community and in Christ.

Co-responsibility and Lay Ministry: empowering all the baptised, women and men, to share responsibility for leadership and mission through new models of ministry and decision-making.


Family: supporting the domestic Church as the primary place of faith transmission and belonging, and strengthening its connection with parishes and schools.

Formation and Catechesis: deepening faith through lifelong formation that is Christ-centred, experiential, and equips the baptised for discipleship in today's world, rooted not only in learning but also in liturgy and sacramental life, so that prayer and worship become living sources of faith, understanding, and mission.












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Healing: acknowledging wounds, especially those caused by abuse; committing to accountability, justice, and reconciliation; and ensuring safe spaces for survivors and all who carry pain.

Women: recognising and including women's gifts, leadership, and co-responsibility at every level of Church life, as a matter of justice and credibility.

Youth: engaging young people with authenticity, offering them meaningful roles in leadership and mission, and listening to their hopes and challenges.

Within our own diocese, baptism, belonging and faith formation, emerged as priorities. Diocesan bodies and parishes will work together in responding to the local and national findings, as together we grow in being a synodal Church - walking together as followers of Christ.

BISHOP DENIS LAUNCHES 'WHY SUNDAY MATTERS'

Speaking in the Cathedral on Sunday, 31 August, Bishop Denis said: "On behalf of the Bishops, I invite you to reflect on your keeping of Sunday as the Lord's Day. Today I launch a Pastoral message titled 'Why Sunday Matters'. Sunday Mass offers us the rhythm for the week that follows. From the very beginning of our Christian faith, Sunday has been central to the life of the Church and remains the heart of Christian practice.

If perhaps your practice has slipped and other things have taken priority; if perhaps you have become accustomed to the webcam; if perhaps since the Covid pandemic you have simply 'gotten out of the habit', I encourage you to return. Know that you are missed and know that you will be welcome."



Why Sunday Matters

An invitation to reflect on Sunday Mass

s we journey through this Jubilee Year of Hope, we, the Irish Bishops, warmly invite all Catholics to reflect on the immense significance of Sunday Mass and, for those who have not yet done so, to return with renewed joy to the celebration of the Eucharist.

Sunday has always been the day of the Lord: the day of resurrection, the day of rest, the day of Eucharist. From the very beginning of our Christian Faith, Sunday has been central to the life of the Church and remains the heart of

life of the Church and remains the heart of Christian practice. It is on this day that we gather as a community, united in our love for Christ, to encounter the risen Lord and be nourished in body and soul.

The Mass is not just a ritual, it is the source and summit of our faith. It is where we encounter Christ in His living presence, and it is through the Eucharist that we are strengthened to live as true disciples. Attending Mass on Sundays, or its vigil on Saturday evening, is not just an obligation; it is a profound privilege and a chance to experience God's love in a deeply personal way. As we come to this sacred celebration let us do so with hearts full of gratitude for the precious gift of Christ's presence among us.

Our invitation to reflect on Sunday Mass is presented through the lens of Synodality – Communion, Participation, and Mission – reminding us that the Eucharist is not just a personal encounter with Christ but also a communal experience that unites us all as the People of God. For deeper reflection, we have also provided thoughtful questions at the end of this message to guide your prayers and meditations.
